



## CONVERSATION CARDS

These cards are designed to highlight changes that have altered life for deaf people. Each card has a picture, a little bit of history, and some prompts to get you started signing or talking about what deaf life is like now, and what it would have been like in the past.

These could be used with a whole class, or as a pair or small group activity. You might find that there are lots of answers for how each one is useful.

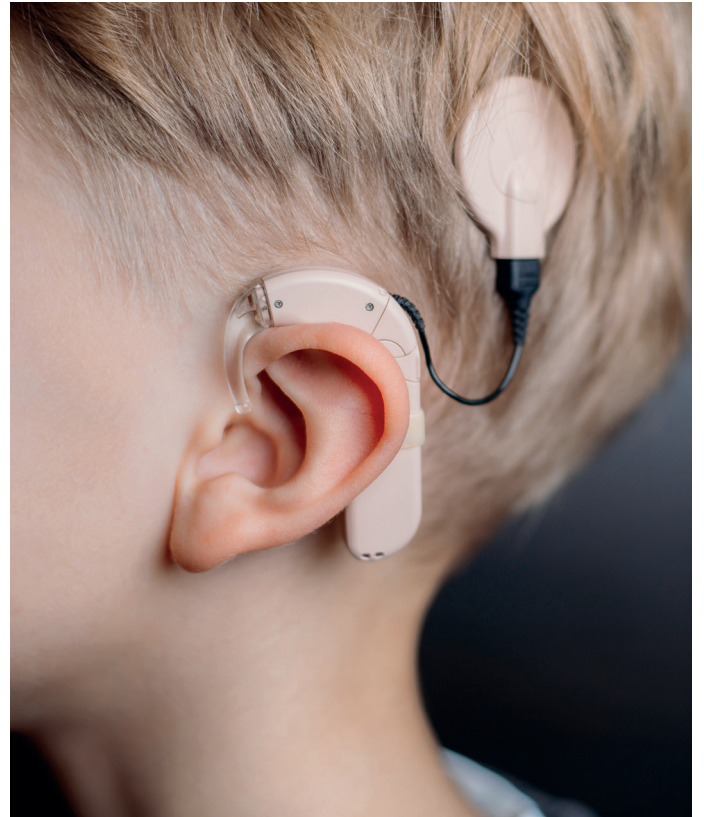
